Educational Background: I have a master's in Public Administration and bachelor's in Political Science.

Job Responsibilities: I am a Budget Analyst for the Office of Financial Services in the City of St. Paul. My responsibilities include looking at where the city spends its money. My job focuses on looking into the next year, and beyond, to try and predict what the city MIGHT spend money on. I then try to find revenues (money coming into the city) to cover everything the city spends. I work with different city departments to find out what their future needs and priorities are and then evaluate whether those needs should be included in the budget. I am also fortunate to work on St. Paul's Capital budget. A capital budget is used specifically for construction projects such as roads, bridges, playgrounds, etc. I work with a citizen committee, the Capital Improvement Budget Committee, which makes recommendations to the city based on project submittals by the community



every two years. St. Paul is one of the very few cities in the United States that gives money to capital projects this way and it is interesting to see the involvement between the City and its residents.

What do you enjoy most about your job? My job consists of a lot of problem solving and critical thinking. You really get to use your brain when you're a budget analyst. A city budget needs to be balanced, meaning all the money that comes into the city must equal the money that goes out of the city. Coming to that balancing point is never easy. You have to weigh options, work with different groups of people, and make recommendations on what is most important to the city. Putting a budget together is much like assembling a puzzle. You have all the pieces, just need to find the right way to fit them all together. There is a common misconception that Budget Analysts have to have an in-depth knowledge of mathematical calculations and financial practices, which is not true. As long as you can critically think, problem solve, and add – subtract – multiply – and divide, you can work on city budgets.

Why have you chosen to work in the public service realm at the City of Saint Paul? I have worked for several large cities throughout my career but St. Paul is by far my most favorite. St. Paul is the most important city in Minnesota because it is the capital. Working with the state capital comes with much more responsibility to make sure everything is done right because St. Paul represents the State of Minnesota to both residents and visitors. I enjoy working for larger cities because of the breadth and scope of the services provided. In St. Paul we have countless parks, a thriving downtown, miles of running paths along the Mississippi River, and a NHL team. I like to think that by being a part of the City of St. Paul, I am helping to make the lives of the residents better.

When you were in high school, did you expect to be doing what you are doing now? Why or why not? No, this is the last thing I ever thought I would be doing for a career. I originally went to a university to study geology. I thought I could be working on the side of a mountain somewhere. That idea lasted for exactly one semester before I changed my major. I went to college during the 2004 presidential campaign and the hype behind the campaign was everywhere. This got me interested in politics, the political process, and the influences people have on one another. When I was trying to figure out my career, I really wanted to be involved in my community. My friend suggested to me that I look into the idea of city government. I took his suggestion and never looked back. City government is the purest form of government where each and every citizen can have a voice and be heard. You will have city council members take your phone calls directly and you can tell them how you feel about issues and things going on in your community. Citizens have direct access to decision makers. The role of city government is much different than the other forms of government. We do the things that you don't think of necessarily when you think government. We are the ones who pick up your trash, clean your water, build your roads, police the streets, and put out fires. If you really want to be involved in the community, city government is the way to go.

What advice do you have for high school students as they're thinking about their future career? Keep current with local events and the world around you. Read your local newspaper and not just headlines online. Be aware, and ask questions. There are countless opportunities to have influence in people's lives, you just have to go out there and find them.

Why have you chosen to work in the public service realm at the City of Saint Paul?


I served in the military and wanted to continue serving at home in a community.

Job Responsibilities:

As a Project Manager I have specific tasks that need to be completed within a specific timeframe and budget. This sounds simple enough if the project only involved me what I do. With Project Management you are responsible to coordinate the work that others need to



do for the project to succeed. You have to ensure that all of the thousands of tasks that need to be completed on time and frequently in a specific order as one depends upon the next to be successful. Projects in the city are rarely isolated to a single department and a small group of employees. This means that the coordination of aligning people, processes and policy can reach and result in working with various departments and people. The current project I am managing will eventually reach every employee in the city.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

As the employee benefits manager for the City, I am responsible for delivering quality benefit plans that attract and retain great employees in the most cost effective manner possible. I oversee the administration of all City benefit plans, including health, dental, life and disability, retirement and any



other City-specific plans. Part of this role is vendor management - ensuring we are partnering with quality service providers at competitive prices. Additionally, I focus on ensuring compliance with federal, state and local laws as well as bargaining contracts. With City management, I develop a budget for benefits, then review and manage costs to that budget. Educational Background:

College degree and a law degree.

Job Responsibilities:

I am the Director of Government Relations for the city. This means I am the chief lobbyist, representing the city before the Minnesota Legislature, the Governor's office, and the U.S. Congress and U.S. Executive branch offices. I help advance the city's interests by helping to secure state or federal funding, or by helping secure changes to the law that benefit the city.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

The ability to represent the capitol city before the legislature and congress is the most rewarding aspect of the job. Each day presents a new challenge, and I am involved in some of the more important issues of the day. Plus, I spend much of the year at the State Capitol, and that means I have a front row seat to some of the major policy debates before the legislature.

Why have you chosen to work in the public service realm at the City of Saint Paul?

Working for the public - and for an elected official like the Mayor, in particular - is very rewarding. The work you do has a direct impact on your community, and your neighbors. There is a great deal of satisfaction knowing that your efforts have improved the lives of others. Plus, I find it very exciting to see the work you've done become law.

When you were in high school, did you expect to be doing what you are doing now? Why or why not?

I did not expect to do this work when I was in high school. The law and politics always interested me, but from a historical perspective, not a practical one. I feel fortunate that I was able to transition these interests in to a career.

What advice do you have for high school students as they're thinking about their future career?

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Jake Spano Office of Mayor Chris Coleman – Director of Marketing

Educational Background: I graduated high school in Lawrence, KS in 1987. In 1991 I received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Studio Art (sculpture) from Hamline University in Saint Paul. My Master's Degree is in Advocacy and Political Leadership from the University of Minnesota - Duluth. I also attended Ealing College in Ealing, England, a city which lies just west of London, England. I've also taken classes at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis Technical and Community College, and Dunwoody Technical Institute amongst others. As you can tell, I like learning.

Job Responsibilities: I have a number of specific duties in my role as the Director of Marketing but in a larger sense, I'm responsible for the "brand" of the city of Saint Paul. That means that it's my responsibility to make sure that when people think of Saint Paul as a place to live, work, visit and play in, they think good thoughts. This means that I spend a lot of time working with groups outside the city government to ensure that they can easily open a business, plan a big event, or have their vision for improving Saint Paul realized.



Specifically some of my bigger duties are managing the online presence of the city via our website (www.stpaul.gov), Facebook, and Twitter (@cityofsaintpaul). I'm also largely responsible for planning big fun events in the city (Red Bull Crashed Ice, River's Edge Music Fest, Fourth of July fireworks, etc). Lastly, I work quite a bit on strategic (think big - long term projects) that is important to the Mayor. Things like ensuring that artists and creative people have a role in making our city a great place to live and work in.

What do you enjoy most about your job? The Mayor is a big, bold thinker and places a lot of trust and responsibility in his team. I'm fortunate that in addition to having a great vision for the city, he also allows his team to find the best ways to make that vision happen and backs us up when we want to go for it! I also love that every day it's something different - one day I could be planning a concert, the next day I'm at an event with players from the Minnesota Wild, and the next could be meeting with the Ambassador of Switzerland to talk about trade and economic development. Everyone I know tells me I have the best job in the city and I'm hard pressed to argue with them;)

Why have you chosen to work in the public service realm at the City of Saint Paul? There are a few reasons - some simple and some more complicated. First, the Mayor asked me to come work for him and that was enough for me! Beyond that though, I used to live in the Midway area - it was my family's first home - and I went to college here so I've always loved it. Second, growing up in my family there was always a discussion happening about how to help others, how to serve others, how to use one's skills to make our little corner of the world better. But for years I worked in the private sector and while I loved much of my work, something was missing. Then Senator Paul Wellstone died along with some of his family and friends in a plane crash and something just changed. I needed a job that provided purpose in addition to money. I needed to contribute. So, I quit my job, went back to school to get a master's degree and ended up working for United States Senator Amy Klobuchar for several years. After leaving her office, I came to work for Mayor Coleman. In the end, I needed more of a purpose in what I was doing so I got involved in public service. I'm also an elected City Council Member in Saint Louis Park which happened after working for the city and realizing all the great things a city can do with its residents.

When you were in high school, did you expect to be doing what you are doing now? Why or why not? NO WAY! In high school I was all prepared to go to college and become a pre-med major and go on to do Sports Medicine. My grandfather had done that and I really enjoyed it. That changed when I was a junior and college and was fortunate to travel overseas for school - I saw and experienced things that opened my eyes and I realized at that point that I wanted to chart a completely new course for myself so I came back home, switched my major to art, and took off from there. It's not easy I know but if there is ever a chance to study abroad, DO IT. Aside from the fun travel, I learned to be self-sufficient when I was 1/2 around the world - it's extremely empowering and confidence building.

What advice do you have for high school students as they're thinking about their future career? I believe strongly that if you are passionate about something go and do that thing. On the other hand, if like me, you have an experience that makes you question that passion, listen to it. Follow it. Some people say, it's their "gut instinct" but whatever you call it, I believe in listening to it. Don't be bound to do something because it's what you think everyone expects you to do. President John Kennedy once gave a speech at Rice University in Texas and in it he had a famous line where he was talking about the dangers of space exploration and he said, "We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard." That speech is worth listening to because in it he is essentially saying the things that we value most, that we hold most dear, that are most important to us, are the things that we work the hardest for. For me, that has meant that I'm always doing something that is "outside my comfort zone" and requires maximum effort but at the same time, that effort has made the successes so much more fun and rewarding.



What do you enjoy most about your job?

One of the main things I like about my job is that it permits me to be outside, which I enjoy especially during the summer months! I also get to interact with a wide range of interesting people and educate them about their trees. It's challenging in that every tree is unique, which makes every work day different and exciting. And I take pride in working for Saint Paul, where I live and am born and raised.

Why have you chosen to work in the public service realm at the City of Saint Paul?

In Saint Paul, there are approximately 120,000 public boulevard trees and 200,000 park trees in a city with over 290,000 citizens. I also get a better understanding of how municipalities work by collaborating with other city departments to solve issues.

Take a variety of classes and immerse yourself in what the college or institution has to offer. 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Ryanna Jackson Parks and Recreation

Educational Background:

Bachelors of Arts in English, minors in Music and History

Job Responsibilities:

I coordinate volunteers for the Saint Paul Natural Resources section, though, like most jobs, I end up doing more than that. I coordinate the majority of the volunteers in Saint Paul parks. These include individual and small groups of volunteers who have adopted certain areas of land, parks and gardens and regularly take care of them. I also work with many large one-time or annual groups who help with large-scale planting, gardening and habitat restoration events. Finally, I manage and coordinate several



large-scale volunteer events, including the department's largest in-house event, the Citywide Spring Cleanup. Volunteer coordinating includes a lot of organization, as you may guess, but also a lot of relationship and partnership building, as well as community outreach. I enjoy giving back to my community. My background reflects years serving in AmeriCorps and many years of volunteerism.
