Subject: CIB Proposal for a Rice Street Traffic Study

To the Capital Improvement Budget Committee:

I'm writing on behalf of St. Paul Smart Trips to express our support for CIB funding for undertaking a multi-modal traffic study of Rice Street as proposed by the District 6 Planning Council. St. Paul Smart Trips is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that improves access and mobility for those who travel in and around St. Paul. This project is also endorsed by St. Paul Walks, an initiative of St. Paul Smart Trips focusing on getting drivers to slow down for pedestrians, specifically at intersections, whether they are marked or unmarked.

Last October, a young boy was hit and severely injured on Rice Street in St. Paul walking to school. These tragic incidents are far too common and can be avoided. Implementing traffic calming measures through changes to design and signage is imperative to preventing future pedestrian crashes.

A traffic study will guide plans for how to improve the conditions for people walking to and from school, for recreation and to local businesses. Incorporating the needs of people who ride the bus, bike and walk into any future plans for Rice Street can only improve the safety, economy and vitality of the street.

We feel that, combined with the City's Complete Streets Policy and recently adopted Bicycle Plan, a traffic study of Rice Street will lay the groundwork for improving the conditions for all users of the road in the short-term and well into the future.
