The main purposes of the new Plan are: to provide a guiding vision for historic preservation in Saint Paul, to formalize City policy regarding historic preservation, to guide public and private investment to further preservation goals, to advocate for historic preservation, and finally to guide the work of the HPC. The strategies and numerous policies are informed by the following principles:

- Preservation is a core community value
- Historic Preservation is a priority for the City of Saint Paul
- Preservation is critical for neighborhood vitality and a sense of place
- Historic resources are unique and irreplaceable, and should be treated accordingly
- Preservation should be integrated with the broader planning process
- Preservation provides an environmentally sustainable alternative to new construction

### **Heritage Preservation Commission**

### **Preservation Education and Policy**

Teaching Saint Paul's residents and visitors about the City's heritage through historic buildings and the urban environment is an ongoing commitment of the Heritage Preservation Commission. The HPC also seeks to improve upon public policies to respond to the ever evolving field of historic preservation.

### **Policy and Preservation Planning**

The Heritage Preservation Commission, as a Certified Local Government, applied for and received a grant from the National Park Service through the Minnesota Historical Society, who administers the U.S. Department of the Interior's Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) program. The grant and the City's matching funds allowed for the completion of Saint Paul's first-ever **Historic Preservation Plan** chapter to be adopted as part of the City's Comprehensive Plan. The Plan will be formally adopted by the City Council in March 2009.

### **Special Projects**

### **Downtown Pilot Façade Improvement Program**

This program was developed to encourage appropriate façade improvements to historic buildings in Downtown and Lowertown and to highlight Saint Paul's rich architectural heritage. Three projects received approval for financial assistance from the program to undertake and complete exterior improvements to their buildings: the J.H. Allen Building at 287 Sixth Street East, the Northwestern Building at 275 Fourth Street East and the Tilsner Building at 300 Broadway Street.

#### **Central Corridor**

Staff and the HPC continued their involvement in the planning process for the **Central Corridor LRT** that will eventually run through both the University-Raymond Commercial Historic District and Lowertown Historic District, as well as along several designated structures and structures potentially eligible for designation.

#### **Legislative Hearings and Historic Resource Reviews**

During February 2008, HPC staff began evaluating all Vacant Buildings classified as "Category 3" for historical and architectural significance. Staff made recommendations to the Legislative Hearing Officer, who then either made recommendations to the City Council or forwarded certain properties to the HPC for further evaluation. The HPC made reviewed five historic resources and recommended that demolition be delayed for all five. The historic resources were: 59 Atwater Street, 242 Morton Street, 667 Sims Avenue, 696 Sims Avenue, and 606-606 1/2 Thomas Avenue. All of the resources reviewed were razed.

### Survey, Evaluation, and Designation

### **Survey and Designation**

The HPC did not add any properties to the survey or propose sites to the City Council for local designation.

The HPC did not comment on any properties proposed for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

### **Design Review**

The HPC protects buildings and districts designated for heritage preservation by reviewing all building permits and other exterior work for these areas. The HPC works with property owners to ensure that exterior changes are compatible with the original architectural design and materials of the buildings. The Commission has published design review guidelines for each district which facilitate the review of projects. The HPC also advises the City Council and Mayor on city-sponsored projects which will affect historic districts.

The HPC reviewed 398 applications during 2008, eight less than the 406 applications reviewed in 2007. Thirty-six were reviewed by the Commission and 362 were reviewed and approved by staff. The HPC also conducted seven pre-application reviews for new construction or rehabilitation projects, five historic resource reviews, five after-the-fact reviews, reviewed one street name change and one lot split.

Of the total applications reviewed, only seven were denied by the HPC. An HPC decision can be appealed to the City Council by an applicant or other party, and for the fiscal year 2008 only one decision was appealed and the City Council granted the appeal. This low denial rate demonstrates the Commission's desire and ability to work with applicants to reach compatible solutions while upholding historic design standards.

#### Heritage Preservation Commission

### **Organization Summary**

The Heritage Preservation Commission (HPC) serves as an advisory body to the Mayor and the City Council on municipal heritage preservation matters. It was created by city ordinance in 1976 to protect and promote the heritage of the City of Saint Paul. The Commission consists of thirteen voting members who are residents of Saint Paul and are appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the City Council. One of the members is a representative of the Ramsey County Historical Society and at present three of the members are professionally registered architects.

The City of Saint Paul is a Certified Local Government (CLG) in the national Historic Preservation Program. The city is certified as having a heritage preservation commission and program that meets federal and state standards. Saint Paul's status as a CLG confirms its commitment to support a qualified heritage preservation commission, maintain a system for the survey and inventory of historic properties, enforce appropriate state and local legislation for the designation and protection of historic properties and provide for public participation in its preservation program.
