

Sustainable Saint Paul Briefings July 2014

A guidebook to building sustainably



The City of Saint Paul, the Center for Sustainable Building Research (University of Minnesota), and the Saint Paul Riverfront Corporation have designed a guidebook to help developers meet Saint Paul's Sustainable Building Policy. The policy was adopted by Mayor Chris Coleman and the City Council and became effective July 1, 2010. It applies to new cityowned buildings and all privately developed new construction projects receiving more than \$200,000 in public funding. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency granted Saint Paul funds to develop this policy, with the intent of creating a model policy that

other cities and counties could adopt.

Green buildings provide many advantages including lower operating costs, higher rents, healthier living and work spaces, reduced use of natural resources and fewer greenhouse gas emissions. <u>Download a copy of the guidebook</u> today.
