




1.26.2021 Unsheltered Homeless Encampments Saint Paul, MN





24/7 On-site Staffing

- Staff reflect the residents and have diverse experiences
- Build relationships with residents
- CPR and Narcan trained

Wraparound Services

- 3 meals per day provided
- On-site mental health services
- Transportation services
- Health care and nursing

Pathways to Housing Stability

- On-site benefit and housing navigation
- Removing barriers for housing readiness

Trauma-informed Security

- Rooted in de-escalation
- Aware of mental health crises
- 24/7 presence
- Inside and outside facility









2021 CITY OF SAINT PAUL ENCAMPMENT MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

- 2020 experience confirmed that homeless encampments do not provide a safe, healthy or secure living environment
- City has thoughtfully closed approximately 50 encampments over the last nine months, aligning resources and services with occupants prior and during closures
- Many occupants are now in new, low-barrier shelters that have been established through city/county partnerships and have access to county 'Step Up' programming
- City will continue to close encampments based on safety risks as long as low barrier shelter beds are available
- City is committed to maintaining all previously closed encampment sites clear. Those who re-occupy will be provided 72 hour notice and access to shelter referrals/services before a site is re-closed

2021 Area Action Plans

City responded by organizing four major Area Action Plans working group engaged in targeted strategies designed to minimize identified local community impacts by mobilizing key partners

- 5th Street and Cedar
- 7th Street W. and Grand Avenue
- Pedro Park/10th Street and Robert St.
- Lowertown (Mears Park) Neighborhood
- Address community impacts include but are not limited to trash, vandalism, aggressive behavior, panhandling, public intoxication, mental health needs, drug dealing, theft
- Timely, iterative, effective response to conditions
- Response consists of specialized teams to address specific concerns

2021 Area Action Plans

1. Strategic Direction: Reduce crime and increase sense of safety and security




