City ARP Strategy

- Address immediate needs
- Strategic planning for key priority areas, incorporating community feedback
- Focus on (1) restoring positions and services cut due to pandemic, (2) one-time investments with long-term impacts that address pandemic challenges, (3) modernizing our services, (4) effectively managing and maximizing resources



City ARP Processes and Reporting

- Departments presented proposals for ARP
- Workgroups reviewed for alignment with community goals and frameworks
- Mayor and Council review and reach agreement
- Federal Funds team review for eligibility
- Funds adopted and projects implemented
- Ongoing monitoring, reporting to U.S. Treasury, and audit preparation



County Partnership: Workforce Initiatives

- Key partnership between the City and County on a suite of workforce investments
- City funding for Workforce Supports: \$16.3 million
 - Includes: \$1 million for no barrier jobs program, \$1 million for creative economy jobs program, and up to \$3 million for lead pipe replacement workforce needs

Supplemental Budget Compromise At Risk

- Senate announced no targets for and supplemental budgets including E-12
- Senate Ed—passed a few minor finance bills
 - Literacy training for teachers
 - Small increase in school safety revenue, include private schools
- Vouchers for both regular and special education students
- Short term substitute teacher bill
- Tuition Billing work group
- Parent bill of rights package



House

- No target as of March 24th
- Prioritizing special education and EL cross subsidy
- VPK base funding and Child Care support
- Teacher of Color/Grow Your Own
- Student and school supports
- Tax target for schools likely small
- Policy bill includes many unfunded mandates



Governor

- Target--\$707 Million in FY23 and \$1.54 Billion in FY24/25
- 2% increase in the formula in FY23
- Revenue for both special ed and EL cross subsidy
- Full funding of VPK, plus birth-3 childcare/scholarship increases and supports (childcare in HHS target)
- Free meals for all students
- Mental Health, Student supports and Literacy proposal
- Teacher of Color, mentoring and retention grant programs


SPPS ARP Goals

Allocation and Planning Process


- Received \$206.9 million

 - Homeowner refund: online, software provider, or by paper
 - Renter refund: software provider or by paper
- Final deadline to claim 2020 refund: 8/15/2022

Special Property Tax Refund: No homeowner income limit; refund limited to \$1,000; property tax increased by more than 12% and increase was at least \$100

Timeline: 6 months: March-September

Overview of Ramsey County American Rescue Plan (ARPA) Priorities and Funding

- Ramsey County received the first of two payments that will total \$106.8 million. The second payment will be made in May 2022.
- Funds must be obligated by December 31, 2024 and spent by December 31, 2026.
- The US Department of Treasury has issued guidance on the funds and continues to provide additional detail. Compliance, Legal and Finance work together to review all ARPA spending plans.
- We continue to look for opportunities for additional revenue and have received funds from FEMA,
 Minnesota Department of Health and other Federal Funds.
