St. Anthony/Rondo Avenue 2026 Resurfacing & Pedestrian and Bike Improvements Project Open House on Wednesday, October 29, 2025

The City of Saint Paul is planning street improvements in your neighborhood. St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue, from Marion Street to Snelling Avenue, will be resurfaced in summer 2026 through a mill and overlay project to create a smoother driving surface.

As part of this work, the city will also add pedestrian and bicycle improvements, similar to those completed on Concordia / Rondo Avenue. In addition, utility companies may complete work in the street before the city's resurfacing project begins.

Location of project work

- Mill and overlay (resurfacing) on St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue from Marion Street to Snelling Avenue
- Addition of an on-street bike lane on St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue from Marion Street to Pascal Street
- Pedestrian crossing improvements, including construction of bumpouts (curb extensions) at Western Avenue and Chatsworth Street

About the mill and overlay process

- The contractor will "mill" (remove) approximately two inches of the existing roadway surface.
- The street will then be "overlaid" (repaved) with new asphalt.
- Repaving work is weather dependent but typically takes two to four days per street segment.
- Once repaving is complete, road striping including installation of the new bike lane will be added.

Safer streets—lane reduction and new bike lane

- This is a resurfacing project, and the existing curb will stay in place.
- The City of Saint Paul received a variance from MnDOT to reduce St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue from two vehicle lanes to one.
 - Because the street receives Municipal State Aid (MSA) funding, a variance was required for a one-way road with fewer than two travel lanes.
- This change allows the city to design a street that better supports neighborhood safety and comfort.
 - Reducing to a single travel lane is expected to slow traffic and make the street safer for everyone, addressing long-standing neighborhood concerns about speeding.
- The change also creates space for a new westbound on-street bike lane, using the area previously occupied by the second travel lane.
 - The bike lane will run along St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue between Marion Street and Pascal Street, connecting with existing and planned bikeways and complementing the eastbound bike lane installed in 2024 on Concordia / Rondo Avenue.
- Together, these improvements will provide a safer, more comfortable experience for people walking, biking, and driving through the neighborhood.
- Parking will remain on the north side of St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue, with only minor adjustments near intersections to accommodate bumpouts and lane changes.

Pedestrian improvements

The city is taking this opportunity to make St. Anthony / Rondo Avenue safer and more comfortable for people walking.

Before paving begins, utility crews may complete work in the area — such as repairing or replacing storm drains — to prepare for these improvements.

The project will:

- Install ADA-compliant ramps to improve accessibility and make crossings easier for everyone.
- Add bumpouts to shorten crossing distances, improve visibility, and encourage slower driving speeds.

Before pedestrian improvements begin

The city is asking property owners and residents to take a few steps to help prepare for construction and keep the project running smoothly.

- Remove any personal property, plantings, or sprinkler systems in the boulevard near planned
 pedestrian improvements, as they may be affected by construction. These items will not be
 replaced by the city.
- **Watch for a flyer on your door** if sidewalk or other pedestrian improvement work is scheduled near your property.
- **Follow all posted signs**, especially "No Parking" signs. Vehicles that are not moved may be ticketed and towed.
- **Expect temporary street closures or lane restrictions** during milling and repaving operations. The city will make every effort to maintain driveway access, but there may be brief interruptions.
- Notify tenants, renters, or visitors about the project and any parking restrictions.

How the project is funded

- The project is funded by the City of Saint Paul and through assessments to abutting property owners.
- The assessment rate has not yet been determined.
- A separate mailing with detailed assessment information will be sent to property owners in November 2025.
