The Downtown Improvement District (DID) is a special service district that focuses on enhancing the cleanliness, safety, and overall appeal of the downtown area. Funded by assessments on property owners within the district, the DID provides services like street cleaning, security patrols, graffiti removal, landscaping, and public space maintenance. Its goal is to create a vibrant, welcoming environment that supports businesses, residents, and visitors, helping to drive economic development and improve quality of life downtown.

At the August 13 City Council Meeting, Council President Noecker recognized the Downtown Ambassadors for their dedication to keeping downtown Saint Paul safe, clean, and welcoming. Their work supports businesses, residents, and visitors, making the city a more vibrant and accessible community.

Downtown Improvement District & Public Safety <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Shared praise for the Saint Paul Police Department for strong recent crime statistics and encouraged everyone to help amplify the positive news, noting that “bad news spreads fast on its own.”</li><li>The Alliance continues to partner with SPPD through contracted overtime, supporting the work of Downtown Ambassadors to address livability issues and improve compliance.<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Current compliance rate when ambassadors make requests: 88%.</li><li>This demonstrates that ambassadors play a strong, active role in maintaining downtown order—not just greeting or litter pickup.</li></ul></li><li>Efforts are also underway to improve compliance and safety on the light rail, in partnership with Metro Transit.</li><li>The Downtown Alliance is renegotiating its contract with Metro Transit to continue and possibly expand these efforts into next year.</li></ul> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>The Safety Communications Center Dispatch and Ambassadors are available from 7 am-11 pm 7 days a week, call or text 651-236-0284 to report concerns or request assistance.</li></ul>

Update presented by SPPD Downtown District Commander Jake Peterson	
Commander Peterson has served with the Saint Paul Police Department for 26 years, with a commitment to revitalizing downtown and strengthening community connections. Saint Paul Police recently launched a new downtown initiative, VIBE (Visible, Intentional, with Balanced Enforcement), that is now five and a half weeks underway. The initiative emphasizes intentional presence, community involvement, and ongoing improvements to the downtown experience. Key points of this initiative: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Objective: Increase visible, intentional policing while maintaining balanced enforcement downtown.</li><li>Implementation: 26 officers are dedicated full-time to the downtown area, providing coverage 24/7.</li></ul> Community Engagement: Residents are encouraged to meet at least one downtown officer by name, fostering familiarity and trust.  Call to Action: Commander Peterson challenged attendees to actively connect with law enforcement as part of a broader strategy to improve downtown safety and community relationships.

Downtown Safety Efforts & Enforcement Activity <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>SPPD recently mobilized additional officers citywide to focus on downtown spaces, parks, and quality-of-life crimes.</li><li>During this focused enforcement period, officers made 142 additional arrests and issued 4,375 citations in the downtown area.<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Many of these were parking-related, addressing frequent community complaints.</li></ul></li></ul> Event & Public Safety Preparedness <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>SPPD is actively preparing for the World Juniors tournament, with a focus on ensuring a safe, welcoming downtown environment for all visitors.</li><li>SPPD continues to partner with Department of Safety &amp; Inspections (DSI), Parks, and Public Works on morning cleanups (6–8 a.m.) across downtown parks and public spaces.</li></ul> Retail Theft & Business Engagement Initiative <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>SPPD is launching a new retail theft prevention initiative in collaboration with the Mayor’s Office and downtown partners.<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>The goal is to standardize communication and procedures between businesses and law enforcement.</li><li>The effort builds on recent trespass training sessions and aims to ensure shared understanding of rules, reporting, and engagement.</li></ul></li><li>The department is exploring assigning a temporary detective dedicated to downtown to support these efforts and address retail and property crimes more directly.</li></ul> Community Resources & Training <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Upcoming virtual public safety trainings hosted by SPPD Crime Prevention:</li></ul>

<i>Update presented by SPPD Senior Commander Nicole Spears</i>
<b>Event Planning &amp; Coordination</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Commander Spears highlighted the collaborative planning for World Juniors, bringing together all agencies involved to run through scenarios ranging from lost children to more serious incidents.</li><li>• This coordination ensures effective problem-solving and rapid response during large events downtown.</li></ul>
<b>Community Collaboration</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• The department engages with local organizations such as Catholic Charities, Assumption Church, and nearby medical providers to improve safety and community outcomes in downtown neighborhoods, including around Dorothy Day.</li></ul>
<b>Downtown Staffing &amp; Event Support</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Downtown precincts remain fully staffed, even amid department-wide shortages, with additional personnel deployed during major events to manage increased activity and maintain public safety.</li></ul>
<b>Retail Theft Prevention Initiative</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• The department is partnering with the City Attorney’s Office to combat retail theft through:<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>○ Educational flyers for downtown businesses</li><li>○ Proactive outreach and meetings with store owners on prevention and response strategies</li></ul></li><li>• Flyers are available for interested businesses, and proactive collaboration aims to reduce incidents and improve response times.</li></ul>

<i>Update presented by Metro Transit Lieutenants Mohamed &amp; Malland</i>	
<p>Staffing &amp; Visibility: Both Metro Transit Lieutenants acknowledged ongoing staffing shortages but highlighted that new officers are being hired. As staffing increases, expect greater presence downtown.</p> <p>Resource Strategy: Currently focusing on high-priority areas such as University Avenue and the downtown corridor. Officers are increasingly on foot this summer with plans to continue bike patrols too. Will also continue efforts to have officers on different beats so that they become more familiar with their assigned geographical area and provide proactive policing as a service.</p> <p>Guiding Mottos: “Presence matters” / “Leaders of presence” – emphasizing visibility so the public feels safe.</p> <p>Security Enhancements: Restoring security positions at Central Station, Union Depot, and 10th Street. Transit agents spending more time on trains, especially with the upcoming BRT Gold Line and B Line.</p> <p>Coordination: Working closely with St. Paul Police through joint downtown details to align goals across agencies.</p> <p>Homeless Action Team: Recognizes many transit riders use trains and stations as shelter. Strategy focuses on combining necessary enforcement with connecting people to resources to avoid simply displacing individuals.</p> <p>Outlook: The agencies are still adjusting and improving, with ongoing efforts to increase community presence and address underlying challenges, not just symptoms.</p>

<i>Written update sent by Lieutenant Kadra Mohamed from Metro Transit</i>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Staffing and presence: We have had an increase in Community Service Officer hiring. We are at 28 which is a record high for our department. We have also had officer academies about every month to increase our officer presence on the system which includes us returning to the beat policing model.</li><li>• Downtown focus: Our Homeless Action Team has begun conducting outreach efforts on board trains starting from the Central Station. Residents should see our Mobile Assessment Vehicle downtown providing resources to our unsheltered clients along with Ramsey County social workers and our contractors Mental Health Minnesota.</li><li>• Coordination with partners: Our officers regularly coordinate with SPPD on enforcement efforts around University Ave. We also partner with different social service agencies to provide unsheltered resources.</li></ul>

<b>June 26 Progress Updates &amp; Ways to Help</b>	
The Ramsey County Attorney’s Office is focused on reducing violence in downtown Saint Paul through initiatives like the Nonfatal Shootings Initiative, which treats nonfatal shootings with high priority; the Healing Streets Project, offering support to those affected by violence; and	

collaborations to improve sexual assault response and survivor support. These efforts aim to increase public safety and provide trauma-informed care.	
August 21 Progress Updates & Ways to Help	
Update presented by Ramsey County Attorney John Choi	
Community-First Public Safety: The County Attorney’s Office is a key pillar alongside police in promoting safety, combining enforcement with upstream prevention and community partnerships.	
Collaboration is Key: Progress happens when agencies work together. Over the past five years, collaborative efforts—including the Violence Reduction Leadership Group—have improved outcomes such as nonfatal shooting clearance rates and reduced auto theft and carjackings.	
Safe and Strong Initiative: Launched in 2024 with Metro Transit Police, this program focuses on enforcement plus connecting individuals to services. It targets persistent challenges along the University Avenue corridor and downtown transit areas.	
Focused Case Management: Cases in the corridor receive special attention, with options like stay-away or trespass orders. Low-level offenses (e.g., fifth-degree drug possession) focus on connecting individuals to treatment rather than long-term incarceration.	
Upstream & Family-Focused Approach: Success in reducing auto theft involved identifying key youth offenders, engaging families, and providing supportive services. This collaborative, relational model is applied to current downtown challenges.	
Information-Sharing & Innovation: Emphasizes cross-agency communication and plans to implement tools (like shared service apps) to track individuals’ connections to supports, improving interventions and continuity of care.	
Goal: Restore safety and confidence in downtown and transit spaces, combining enforcement with prevention, supportive services, and community engagement.	
Call to Action: County Attorney Choi encourages residents to report concerns, ask questions, and engage directly with his office.	
October 16 Progress Updates & Ways to Help	
Update presented by Chris Tolbert of the Ramsey County Attorney’s Office	
Update provided on recent trends in violent crime and ongoing collaborative efforts among law enforcement and city partners to improve public safety and quality of life across Saint Paul and Ramsey County. <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Violent crime is down 53% in Ramsey County compared to the 2022 peak (Jan–Aug data).<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>This reduction follows several years of coordinated work between the County Attorney’s Office, Saint Paul Police Department (SPPD), the Mayor’s Office, City Council, and the Sheriff’s Office.</li></ul></li><li>Nonfatal shootings: Clearance rates have jumped from 35% in 2023 to over 70% this year, thanks to SPPD’s new Nonfatal Shooting Unit, which treats nonfatal incidents with the same seriousness as homicides.<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Results: Nonfatal shooting incidents are down 50% from last year, and the County Attorney’s Office is charging 90% of presented cases—a sign of strong investigations and coordination.</li></ul></li><li>Homicides: The city continues to see historically low homicide numbers this year, which Tolbert attributed to these same joint efforts.</li><li>Quality of life issues: The County Attorney’s Office is also supporting ongoing work on downtown quality-of-life and livability challenges—particularly the open drug market and disorder issues—led by the City, Ramsey County, SPPD, Metro Transit, and others.</li></ul>	
Emphasized that these outcomes are the result of collaboration and shared leadership across jurisdictions.	
December 11 Progress Updates & Ways to Help	
Update presented by Chris Tolbert of the Ramsey County Attorney’s Office	
<b>Safe &amp; Strong Initiative</b> Chris Tolbert highlighted the Safe & Strong Initiative, a collaborative effort launched by Metro Transit, Saint Paul Police, Ramsey County Sheriff’s Office, and the City Attorney’s Office to reduce both crime and fear of crime along light rail corridors, from Snelling Avenue to downtown platforms.	
<b>Crime Trends &amp; Focus Areas</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>The initiative primarily tracks felony-level offenses, including:<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Drug possession and sales</li><li>Weapons violations</li><li>Felony assault</li><li>Domestic assault</li><li>Terroristic threats</li></ul></li><li>Misdemeanor or quality-of-life offenses are generally not prosecuted by the County Attorney’s Office but are addressed by law enforcement.</li></ul>	
<b>Technology &amp; Coordination</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Ramsey County is exploring the use of the Guides app (originating in Long Beach, CA) to provide officers with real-time information on repeat offenders and stay-away/no-contact orders.</li><li>The app is intended to improve officer safety, enforcement consistency, and coordination among multiple law enforcement agencies on the light rail and surrounding areas.</li></ul>	
<b>Partnership &amp; Goals</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>The initiative emphasizes interagency collaboration to enhance public safety, reduce crime, and improve community confidence in downtown transit areas.</li></ul>

City planners and the Downtown Alliance recommended elevating 5th Street to become the main pedestrian thoroughfare, linking landmarks like Rice Park, Mears Park, the Central Station, and CHS Field.

Project Timelines:

- Robert Street: Substantially complete this year; some items continuing into 2026.
- 7th Street by the Downtowner: Expected to wrap up in September.
- Minnesota Street: Scheduled for completion this season.

Coordination & Communication:

- Outreach to businesses and residents, weekly construction updates.
- Collaboration with partners including Ramsey County, MnDOT, and Metro Transit.
- Plans to improve on-site communication and information at major construction sites.

Public Works Focus Areas:

- Completing ongoing construction projects (e.g., Kellogg Bikeway, Robert, Minnesota).
- Developing the Downtown Streets and Sidewalks Plan.
- Implementing improvements at key downtown intersections.

**October 16 Progress Updates & Ways to Help**

*Update presented by City of Saint Paul Deputy Mayor Jaime Tincher*

The Deputy Mayor provided an overview handout of current city initiatives and investments designed to enhance downtown Saint Paul, highlighting public-private partnerships, infrastructure improvements, and beautification efforts.

- Downtown roadmap & goals: [The City has developed a two-page roadmap](#) outlining departmental priorities, with three core goals:
  - Safe, welcoming, and vibrant downtown experience (public safety focus)
  - Public infrastructure improvements
  - Enhancing vibrancy through community and placemaking initiatives
- Public infrastructure:
  - Garbage and recycling container replacement: 81 new BigBelly containers will replace existing downtown litter bins. The new containers will be equipped with a compactor increasing the capacity to 150 gallons per bin, improving efficiency for public works and unifying streetscape aesthetics. They will also reduce labor time, risk of repetitive injury, and exposure to biohazards.
    - New containers will be installed the week of November 17 and all existing bins owned by the city will be removed.
    - The City is working with the Downtown Alliance to repurpose the existing mosaic containers. Short term, these will be stored and repaired at the City’s Solid Waste and Recycling Facility.
  - Construction updates & communication: New banners with QR codes are being deployed on all construction projects to provide real-time updates, explain project goals, and encourage public understanding.
    - Minnesota Street Reconstruction is completed, and the roadway is open! This was a three-year street reconstruction effort from Kellogg Blvd to 11<sup>th</sup> Street.
    - Robert Street and 10<sup>th</sup> Street intersection reopened! The City has continued to do robust engagement with businesses along Robert Street. Many businesses were involved for the recent opening of Pedro Park.
    - We are working with Robert Street businesses to see if they would like to do a “soft opening” from 10<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> Street when that segment is completed but not open for traffic.
    - The City continues to gather community input on the [Downtown Streets and Sidewalk Plan](#) to develop a shared vision for key streets in downtown Saint Paul.
  - Construction “survival kits”: Public works is working with affected businesses and residents to provide tools and guidance to minimize disruption from upcoming projects.
- Engagement: Residents and businesses are encouraged to sign up for construction updates and reach out with questions or feedback as new projects move forward.
  - Public Works continues to put together a weekly [downtown construction map](#), highlighting any road or lane closures to help people get in, out, and around downtown. This weekly map is regularly shared by Downtown Alliance and in all the downtown weekly construction updates.

INVEST IN, MAINTAIN, AND IMPROVE PUBLIC SPACES	(Saint Paul Parks and Rec - see below)
<b>June 26 Progress Updates &amp; Ways to Help</b>	
Ecolab Plaza, now known as Osborn Plaza, is undergoing a significant transformation in downtown Saint Paul. Originally a concrete sidewalk and plaza area between Ecolab's headquarters, the Landmark Center, and the Hamm Building, the space is being reimagined into a vibrant green community area.	
Hamm Plaza is being redeveloped to enhance transit access, pedestrian infrastructure, and green space. Key upgrades include an expanded Metro Transit Gold Line stop, improved bike and pedestrian connections via the Capital City Bikeway, and new landscaping with trees and benches. Ecolab, headquartered nearby, is contributing to the project with a \$2 million investment to transform the area into a vibrant community green space. The City’s Parks and Recreation Department is leading the redevelopment to create a more welcoming hub for residents, workers, and visitors.	
Pedro Park is nearly doubling in size—from 0.45 to 0.87 acres—transforming into a true urban oasis. The expanded park is designed to cool downtown heat islands, boost property values, and bring new life to the street level. It marks the culmination of over 20 years of community-driven advocacy. Construction is ongoing, with infrastructure and amenities rolling out first, and a grand opening anticipated in spring or summer 2025.

<i>Update presented by City of Saint Paul Parks and Recreation Director Andy Rodriguez</i>	



Volunteer & Community Partnerships: Acknowledged the critical role of volunteers and community groups, including Friends of Mears Park, in maintaining and activating downtown parks.

Park Activation & Events: Summer initiatives included happy hours, block parties, and collaborations with local businesses (e.g., Gambit Brewing) to bring more visibility and engagement to park spaces.

Public Safety Collaboration: Partnering with city departments and the Police Department to support unsheltered residents and mitigate drug use, ensuring safer, more enjoyable parks.

Pedro Park Grand Opening: Ribbon-cutting scheduled for September 4th, 4–6 p.m. The park features vibrant spaces, a new dog park, and programming supported by Downtown Street Team ambassadors and placemaking consultants.

Other Park Projects:

- Osborne Plaza: Significant renovation planned within 12–18 months, possibly breaking ground this fall.
- Ham’s Plaza: Re-envisioning in collaboration with Ecolab; timeline nearly finalized
- Mears Park: Improvements including replacement of the retaining wall to enhance existing spaces.

Active Recreation Planning: Exploring opportunities for pickleball courts and other active recreation downtown.

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- Downtown roadmap & goals: [The City has developed a two-page roadmap](#) outlining departmental priorities, with three core goals:

- Pedro Park: Officially cut the ribbon! The parks use has been excellent for both the immediate neighborhood and downtown overall. The City has already hosted several events and plans to continue that momentum into next year.
- Osborn Plaza: A contractor bid was awarded this week. The City expects to hold a celebration and begin some initial work before winter. The project represents a significant upgrade to the park space. It aligns with the nearby housing project in the former Ecolab building as well as future plans for the Alliance Bank Center.
- Downtown Utility Box Art: Parks and Public Works partnered with Forecast Public Art to wrap 16 utility boxes throughout downtown.
- Mears Park: Recently hosted a photo exhibition – “By a Thread: Downtown Series” – by Katie Howe, featuring downtown residents, employees, and business owners who keep the area thriving. The exhibit will remain on display until winter.
- Rice Park and Mears Park: As we’re getting closer to the holiday lighting season, partners and friend groups are finalizing dates for celebrations.

The RiversEdge project in downtown Saint Paul is an \$800 million mixed-use development featuring a 9-acre riverfront park, office and residential towers, retail, and public amenities like an amphitheater and riverwalk. Led by Ramsey County and AECOM, it aims to revitalize the riverfront with sustainable design and boost economic growth. Schematic designs for the park and infrastructure are complete and community engagement is underway.

Downtown Housing Projects <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Ramsey County has an urgent and evident need for affordable housing, especially for individuals and families with household incomes less than 30% of the Area Median Income (AMI).</li><li>A key strategy to meet this need is to retain existing affordable housing and the county board just voted to support two projects located in downtown Saint Paul to complete critical maintenance and upkeep projects to ensure 10 units of affordable housing at 30% - 60% are maintained for decades to come.</li><li>Using Local Affordable Housing Aid, \$1.55 million was invested into the Minnesota Park and Presshouse apartments which will ensure 10 households have access to affordable housing for another 30-years.</li></ul>	
RiversEdge <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>The county continues to focus on site readiness by clearing the path for the private development opportunity, designing the underlying infrastructure of the future public space, and addressing various financial, legal, and technical obstacles.</li><li>Current work is focused on a phasing plan, including verifying the appropriate size and timing of the parking structure, a foundational piece of the redevelopment. The investment in parking for both the site and downtown is being evaluated to best serve the project and broader downtown needs.</li><li>Additional activity has been around making some short-term modest improvements to the look of the jersey barriers along Kellogg. Keep an eye out for additional beautification efforts to the site as an interim use while the site is readied for development.</li></ul>

**Metro Square / County Workforce Relocation**

- Ramsey County was the first government entity to bring employees back to the office in 2022, recognizing the importance of in-person collaboration and downtown vitality.
- The County will move 1,000 employees into the Metro Square building in the first quarter of 2026.
  - This will significantly increase foot traffic, energy, and customers for surrounding downtown businesses.

**Downtown Housing Investments**

- In spring 2025, Ramsey County invested over \$5 billion to help revitalize distressed properties across the county.
- Downtown Saint Paul projects supported through this investment include:
  - American House on Wacouta Street
  - Apartments above the Dorothy Day and Higher Ground (on the Catholic Charities campus)
  - Minnesota Place at 4th & Cedar
- This year’s funds will focus on:
  - Rehabilitation and operating reserves for the Press House Apartments (144 units at 4th & Cedar)
  - Conversion of office space and efforts to make rents more affordable at Minnesota Place (77 existing units)

**RiversEdge Project**

- The County shares the public’s impatience for progress on the RiversEdge development.
- Updates are expected to be shared at the December Downtown Action Series meeting.
- Behind the scenes, negotiations and complex work are actively underway to advance the project.

**Landmark Center Events**

- The County operates the Landmark Center, which will host:
  - Great Pumpkin Halloween Festival – Sunday, October 26
  - Gangster Ghost Tour – Wednesday, October 28
  - Annual Holiday Bazaar – First weekend in December

**Union Depot Events & Activities**

- The County also operates Union Depot, which will host:
  - Regular blood drives are held every other month at Union Depot — attendees are encouraged to participate.
  - Ghost Tours will take place throughout Halloween week.
  - The Tree Lighting Ceremony is scheduled for Saturday, December 5, a popular annual event.
  - The Canadian Pacific Holiday Train will arrive December 13, offering a family-friendly celebration.
  - The European Christmas Market returns for its biggest year yet, taking place the last weekend in November and the first two weekends in December.

**County Investments in Downtown**

- Ramsey County owns and actively invests in several key downtown properties:
  - Union Depot
  - Landmark Center
  - 5th and Wacouta Building, purchased to house the County Attorney’s Office
  - Metro Square Building, undergoing significant renovation to accommodate county employees
- Highlighted the success of the Borealis train service to Chicago, which has already carried nearly 250,000 passengers since July, underscoring its role in connecting Saint Paul regionally.

**Federal Shutdown Impacts on County Services**

- On Tuesday 10/14, the County received notice of a significant risk to SNAP (food assistance) benefits due to the ongoing federal government shutdown. As of that day, 1,500 residents were waiting for staff assistance at County service centers.
- Initial federal guidance indicated eligibility processing would stop, but temporary reopenings have since allowed limited continuation through the end of October.
- If the shutdown persists, no SNAP benefits will be issued in November, and similar risks exist for:
  - WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) programs
  - MFIP (Minnesota Family Investment Program) cash assistance
- The County is operating in emergency management mode, working to prepare for the potential loss of benefits and mitigate impacts for vulnerable residents.

**County Budget Overview**

- Ramsey County operates on a biennial budget and is currently developing its 2026–2027 budget.
- County Manager Becker described this as the most difficult budget in decades, requiring significant reductions, including:
  - Reduced library hours
  - Program closures
  - Staff reductions and layoffs
- These challenges stem from what national experts are calling a “\$10 trillion shift” in responsibilities from the federal government to local governments.
  - The County is contending with new federal mandates, executive orders, and budget constraints—many of which have been challenged through the Minnesota Attorney General’s Office.
  - The House reconciliation bill is expected to have major impacts on Medicaid funding, beginning in late 2026, with Minnesota particularly vulnerable due to its unique administrative structure.
  - The state budget also faces structural deficits and unfunded mandates that fall to counties to implement without matching funding.

**Funding Realities & Property Tax Pressures**

- Counties have limited financial tools, and Ramsey County is funded 47% by property taxes (compared to about 37% in Hennepin County).

- Residents and stakeholders may be asked to make phone calls or send emails to legislators to support key initiatives.

**Commercial Underutilized Building (CUB) Tax Credit**  
O'Rourke highlighted the CUB credit, a tax incentive for revitalizing underutilized commercial buildings downtown. The credit did not pass last year due to budget constraints but is expected to be a focus again in collaboration with business partners and the city this session.

**Community Engagement**  
Ramsey County staff encouraged attendees to stay involved and be ready to act on legislative opportunities as details emerge over the coming months.

Skyway System

SPDDC emphasized that skyways remain a priority and an ongoing, near-daily focus. Where SPDDC has ownership or involvement, efforts are underway to reopen closed segments as quickly as possible, with continued coordination anticipated.

Strategic Property Acquisitions

SPDDC announced the acquisition of the Empire Building and adjacent Endicott Arcade along 5th Street — former Madison Equities properties that have been vacant for several years. The \$745,000 purchase was fully funded through private investment, with no public funds required. Cushman & Wakefield will serve as property manager.

5th Street Revitalization & Downtown Core

The acquisitions advance SPDDC’s Downtown Investment Strategy, with a particular focus on revitalizing 5th Street as a key connector between downtown’s major civic destinations. The Empire Building includes approximately 12,000 square feet of ground-level commercial space, presenting near-term opportunities for street-level activation and retail uses.

Reimagining the Downtown Core

SPDDC noted that parts of the downtown core require a fundamentally new approach — not a return to what existed previously. The organization is assembling a strong team to lead this work and emphasized the need for a higher level of engagement to reimagine how these spaces function moving forward.

Community Engagement Ahead

SPDDC will be engaging residents, stakeholders, and businesses as plans develop through the broader *Reimagine Downtown Saint Paul: Transforming the Core* initiative, ensuring community aspirations are balanced with market realities.

Downtown Alliance Overview

The Saint Paul Downtown Alliance is a nonprofit organization launched in 2018 with a mission to drive vitality in downtown Saint Paul. Over the past 7.5 years, the Alliance has led major initiatives including the Downtown Improvement District (DID), which deploys street ambassadors focused on safety, cleanliness, and hospitality; produced and sponsored events that activate downtown; and served as a central advocate for increased resources and investment in the downtown core. More recently, the Alliance launched the Saint Paul Downtown Development Corporation to directly address real estate challenges and opportunities downtown.

Reimagine Downtown Saint Paul: Transforming the Core

The Alliance, in partnership with Creative Catalyst and Mend Collaborative, is leading *Reimagine Downtown Saint Paul: Transforming the Core* — a fast-paced, community-driven planning and engagement effort focused on approximately 12 blocks at the heart of downtown. This initiative is not a traditional long-term plan, but a targeted, 4–6 month process designed to respond to rapid changes and emerging opportunities in the downtown core, particularly in light of recent strategic property acquisitions and evolving market conditions.

Community Engagement & Early Participation

The initiative launched with an online community survey and interactive mapping tool, allowing participants to share ideas, highlight assets, identify challenges, and react to others’ suggestions. Early engagement has been strong, with more than 1,600 website visits, 500+ completed surveys, and approximately 300 comments submitted via the interactive map.

Upcoming Engagement Phases

- December–January:** Continued survey outreach and pop-up engagement events throughout downtown, including in skyways and at community gatherings.
- February:** A series of “Design Sprint” events where community members will review what was heard, collaborate with design professionals, and help shape actionable ideas and concepts for the downtown core.

Participants are encouraged to sign up for the project mailing list to receive updates, event invitations, and opportunities for topic-specific engagement (e.g., business, public realm, landscape, activation).

What Success Looks Like

Success for this process means developing a clear, actionable short-term direction for activating downtown’s core over the next several years — not a rigid step-by-step plan, but a shared sense of priorities, values, and direction that can guide decision-making, investment, and future projects. Community input will help establish a common vocabulary and framework to inform both public and private efforts moving forward.

**August 21 Progress Updates & Ways to Help**

New Visitor Kiosks: Two interactive kiosks now available at Landmark Center and River Center, offering maps, dining suggestions, and things to do. Feedback is encouraged to improve the program.

Minnesota Yacht Club Festival: Downtown hotel occupancy hit 96% on peak days, with a significant economic impact on local hospitality and retail. The festival added a third day, attracting a mix of local (56%) and regional visitors (33%).

- Minnesota Yacht Club Festival: The event generated an estimated \$3 million in economic impact through spending on hotels, restaurants, retail, and recreation — underscoring the importance of major events to Saint Paul’s economy.
- Holiday season preview: Visit Saint Paul will host a hospitality meeting (open to all) on November 12 at Union Depot, featuring updates on holiday events and the upcoming World Juniors Hockey Championship.
- World Juniors Hockey Tournament: Running December 26–January 5, the 10-nation international tournament is expected to draw over 100,000 hockey fans to the region, with championship games at the newly renamed Grand Casino Arena (formerly Xcel Energy Center).
- Business engagement – “Puck Partners” initiative: Local restaurants and retailers are invited to share updated hours, special offers, and promotional details for inclusion in visitor guides and hospitality outreach during the tournament period.

  - **World's Largest Hockey Puck** - as seen in today's Pioneer Press: [In Downtown St. Paul, World's Largest Hockey Puck Seeks Sponsors](#)
    - Visit Saint Paul, the city’s official convention and tourism bureau, has skated out a plan to assemble the world’s largest hockey puck — a 5,000-pound testament to the excitement around the international round-robin style tournament.
    - The puck, which is being made at the Wonder Studio fabrication shop on St. Paul’s old Hamm’s Brewery campus and at TC Rigging/Allied Productions in Oakdale, will be displayed as part of the Bold North Breakaway Fan Fest from Dec. 26 to Jan 5.
    - Visit St. Paul is asking sponsors, including everyday residents and small businessowners, to donate between \$25 and \$5,000 to help roll out the giant puck, which will be, in a word, large. Donations of any amount will be accepted, and sponsors will be recognized on a webpage “Hall of Fame,” which is coming soon. The webpage will include an option to [donate \\$25 on behalf of a youth hockey player](#), which earns the player a commemorative vinyl sticker.

**World Junior Hockey Championship Coming to Downtown Saint Paul**

The 2026 IIHF World Junior Hockey Championship, an international U20 hockey tournament, will take place in downtown Saint Paul from December 26 through January 5. Saint Paul successfully won the bid to host this major global event, which is celebrating its 50th anniversary and will feature 10 nations competing across 29 games. The majority of games involving Team USA, along with the medal rounds, will be hosted at Grand Casino Arena, with additional games at Mariucci Arena.

**Fan Fest Activations: “Bold North Breakaway”**

- A series of free, public fan-fest events — branded as Bold North Breakaway — will activate downtown throughout the tournament. Activations will take place in Rice Park, Landmark Plaza, RiverCentre, and surrounding areas, and will include:
- Synthetic ice rinks for skating and skills activities
  - Securian Financial bumper cars on ice
  - Tria Skills Rink with host various activations ie. Mini golf on ice, etc.
  - Health Partner Breakaway Box is a warming tent with food and beverages hosted by Tom Reid’s
  - A bonfire and s’mores in Rice Park hosted by PNC Bank

These events are designed to create a festive, family-friendly atmosphere and draw residents and visitors into downtown throughout the tournament.

**Downtown Impacts & Opportunities**

There will be some road closures associated with the event, particularly in the downtown core. In addition, Parks & Recreation highlighted numerous volunteer opportunities, with volunteers receiving event swag including scarves, hats, jackets, and mittens.

**Regional & International Significance**

This marks the seventh time the World Junior Championship has been hosted in the United States. While teams and fans will largely be based downtown, exhibition games will also take place in communities across Minnesota, including Duluth, Bemidji, and Rochester, expanding the event’s reach statewide.
