Notes: 1) The person to whom this permit is issued, agrees to do the work according to the terms of this permit established on page 2 and to be personally and directly responsible for all damages to persons or property arising from the work hereby permitted or authorized to be done while agreeing to indemnify and hold the City of Saint Paul harmless from any loss, claim, damage, or expenses arising therefrom. The said person further agrees to repair all disturbances of public grounds, if disturbed by permit holder under this permit, to the satisfaction of the Director of Parks and Recreation and in case the permit holder fails or neglects to do so, that the said Director may have the work of restoration performed and the permit holder hereby agrees to pay said costs thereof; **2)** Damage to tree(s) located on public grounds is subject to restitution as determined by the forestry manager-City Code Chapter 176, "Preservation and Protection of Trees;" **3)** Trees removed from public grounds are subject to replacement or compensation equal to the value of the tree(s) as determined using the latest edition of the "Minnesota Supplement to the Guide for Plant Appraisal;" **4) Revision-January 2020**

Terms and Conditions-2020

Planting

Permits for planting on public property are subject to review by Forestry staff based on site conditions and planting goals outlined in the Street and Park Tree Master Plan. Underground utilities must be located prior to planting.

1. **TREE STOCK:** Tree(s) must be cultivated nursery stock with a form typical of the species, not less than 8 feet tall and 1.5 inches in diameter, measured 6 inches above the ground.
2. **UTILITIES MUST BE LOCATED:** Property owner must contact Gopher State One Call at (651) 454-0002 or (800) 252-1166 to have underground utilities located before a permit application will be reviewed. Utility locates are valid for fourteen calendar days and must be renewed if planting does not occur within this time. This is a free service.
3. **LOCATION:** Specific location shall be determined by the Forester/Forestry Manager after utilities are located.
4. **SIZE OF PLANTING HOLE:** Dig hole a minimum of 24 inches wider than the root ball and a depth equal to the depth of the root ball with the first lateral root at ground level. The root graft collar should not be covered with soil or mulch.
5. **WATER:** Water the newly planted tree every 5-10 days the first year, especially during extremely hot, dry weather or if in a sandy soil. Water should be applied slowly using a hose or watering bag to thoroughly soak the root zone.
6. **INSPECTION:** Trees found to be improperly planted must be corrected as determined by the Forester/Forestry Manager.

Decorative Lighting

Lighting and power cords shall be loosely placed on trees. Fasteners, including but not limited to nails and staples, shall not be used to attach lighting to trees. Trees shall not be pruned to facilitate the installation of lighting or power cords. Decorative lighting must be removed by April 1st to allow for tree growth and prevent damage to trunks and branches.

Tree Sculpture

Tree Sculptures require design approval and the property owner to carry a liability rider on their insurance policy. Work must be performed by an insured sculptor. Additional application materials are required. Contact the Forestry office at for further details.

Bracing

Bracing in a public tree shall only be installed by the City of Saint Paul. Upon review, City of Saint Paul Forestry staff shall determine the need for bracing, the type of bracing to be installed, or if other work may be necessary including trimming or removal of the tree.

The following tree work on public property must be completed by a licensed and insured tree contractor. A list of licensed contractors is available from the Department of Safety and Inspections at 651.266.8989. The person to whom the permit is issued is responsible for the disposal of all tree waste generated by the trimming or removal of the public tree(s), stump(s), and root(s).

Removals

Trees on public property are removed to promote public safety and mitigate unsound or damaged tree structure. Trees that are dead or exhibit declining health or disease, are invasive species, or are in conflict with right of way construction projects are also subject to removal. In most cases, trees that provide value to the urban landscape and benefit the community will not be removed. The final decision to remove a tree rests with the City of Saint Paul.

1. **TREE REMOVAL** on public land must include stump removal.
2. **REMOVAL OF STUMPS/ROOTS** must be removed to a depth of at least 8 inches below ground level and the hole refilled with topsoil. Underground utilities must be located prior to stump or root removal by calling Gopher State One Call at (651) 454-0002 or (800) 252-1166. This is a free service.
3. Trees removed from public grounds are subject to replacement or compensation equal to the value of the tree(s) as determined by the forestry manager using the latest edition of the "Minnesota Supplement to the Guide for Plant Appraisal."

Chemical and Other Treatments (Includes: chemical injections, root graft barrier installation, or other treatments)

Chemical injections shall be done by a licensed contractor using a trunk injection system (soil drenches are not an approved application method). Treatment does not guarantee that the tree will not be removed in the future.

1. **ANY TREATMENT** to public tree(s) does not preclude removal of tree if condemned under any "Shade Tree Disease Control Ordinance" or other City Ordinance. Any treatment must meet current ANSI A300 Arboricultural Standards.

Pruning

Public boulevard trees are pruned to promote proper tree structure and to remove dead, damaged and unsound wood.

1. **PRUNING:** Pruning shall comply with the ANSI A300 standards. Make all cuts sharp and clean. When removing heavy limbs, cut from the underside first, then make the second cut a few inches further out on the branch, to avoid tearing wood and bark down the branch or trunk. Topping and pollarding are not allowed practices.
2. **TIMING:** Follow recommended pruning schedules to reduce the spread of insects and disease. Oak, honeylocust, elm, and crabapple should be pruned November-March while trees are dormant.
3. **DAMAGED OR LOOSE BARK** should be cut away, using a sharp knife or chisel, leaving no sharp corners, to a location at which live bark clings tightly to the trunk.
4. **LOWER LIMBS** should be removed to form a symmetrical shape and allow 16' of clearance on the street & sidewalk side.
5. **THINNING** should only be done to remove damaged, weakened and diseased branches or to improve the structure of the tree. Remove the least desirable of any crossing or rubbing branches. Wounds should not be painted. Exceptions: oak tree wounds should be painted April 1 to July 1; honeylocust and fruit tree wounds should be painted during the growing season.
