Site 21RA0084 consists of limestone foundations and artifacts that, according to historical maps, are associated with a c.1895-c.1915, two-story dwelling.

The dwelling is not present in 1892 (Donnelly), but is recorded on the 1896 (Rascher) and 1903 (Sanborn) insurance maps. A 1908 map (Smyth) denotes it as an outbuilding and by 1915 (Hopkins) it was removed. Per the 1903 Sanborn fire insurance map, the assigned address was 833 Mound, although on the 1900 census it was enumerated as 827B and is referred to in city directories as being to the rear of either 825 or 827 Mound.

The house was the residence of Anna and John (son of Peter J. and Anna "Mary" Giesen) Giesen, and was one of four adjacent Giesen homes (825, 827, and 8278 Mound and 147 Maple) recorded on the 1900 census. City directories indicate that John and Anna Giesen continued to reside in the home through Anna's death in 1907. The following year the Giesens sold the property.

This synopsis indicates that the building was used for a limited time (c.1895-c.1905) as the home of John and Anna Giesen, before being converted to an outbuilding about the time Eric V. Hauser acquired the property in 1908 and was subsequently razed.
