

Great question, what does it mean for you? Can you tell me if you've seen or heard anything different lately?

ICE are officers who come to arrest specific people. But they are not being very careful and they are making mistakes.


Adults are staying home to be careful. We know how to be safe and how to keep you safe.

and be silly too.






**When I don't feel good,
